AGNES OF GOD — A dreary job of paint-by-numbers playwriting by a Broadway newcomer named John Pielmeier, who baildly imitates at least a dozen other Broadway plays. It's about a young nun (Carrie Fisher) who kills the baby she's given birth to in her convent cell, the psychiatrist (Elizabeth Ashley) who tries to ferret out the truth of the case, and the Mother Superior (Geraldine Page) who tries to hide it. Hypnotic seizures, strangled fetuses and (by a startling special effect) bleeding stigmata are the grim stuff of this grisly play, though it's beautifully acted by its cast of three.
